### Safeguarding Update

There have been a few concerns brought to me over drop offs and pick-ups. I know they are busy times of day but the safety of our children is paramount. It is advised that parents park in the village hall carpark as parking on the road reduces visibility.

Also the speed limit along the road during school time is 20 miles per hour. Cars have been seen speeding and a few narrow misses have been noted.

Finally I would advise all parents to check the height of their child and ensure they have the correct car seats.

The police hold the driver of the vehicle to account against the following criteria.

'Children must <u>normally use a child car seat</u> until they're 12 years old or 135 centimetres tall, whichever comes first.

Children over 12 or more than 135cm tall <u>must</u> wear a seat belt.'
